


2025 JRI Economics Department Internship Testimonial

• Why did you apply for this internship?

As a graduate student who's passionate about data collection and research to improve policy, this internship seemed like a perfect way to better my skills and learn more about the energy industry. With JRI being home to established economists and quality research, I believed that the experience I would gain would be valuable for my future career. Also, I have always wanted to travel to Japan and experience its rich culture.



Please describe what you did during the internship, including memorable experiences.

The most important part of the internship was supporting a research project, which focused on the importance of domestic solar panel manufacturing with regards to economic security. However, there was no shortage of memorable experiences outside of my work: Most notably, JRI was kind enough to give me a tour of Tokyo, which included visiting the Tokyo Stock Exchange, the National Diet, and Tokyo Tower. Additionally, we took a two-day trip to Osaka, where we visited the JRI Osaka office and spent one day at the Osaka Expo. Not only did I learn about the different projects being done by the consulting and research departments, but the Osaka Expo was a great experience that enriched my knowledge about countries from all over the world.
